Hi boys and girls welcome to The Hexagon Project!
A Project Based on Interdependence

This is a 2 week assignment:

Part 1 “Message and Sketch” due May 25th

Part 2 “Final Design” due June 1st

PART 1 : due May 25th

Hopefully you followed the arrow prompts in order from 1-4 and you have learned what the Hexagon Project is and saw the example sheet of “Interdependence Themes” for the project as well as a hexagon template.

Now, I want you to think about the “Interdependence Themes”. **What are you passionate about?** The environment? Equality? Kindness?

Once you decide on a theme, you need to narrow it down. For instance if you choose kindness, you may want to narrow that down to anti bullying or accepting others. Or, if you choose the environment, you may want to narrow that down to keeping the oceans clean, or recycling.

Once you have narrowed down your theme, you need to create your **"MESSAGE"!!!** So, if I decide on recycling, my message might be "Keep the Earth Clean by Recycling" or "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle the Earth Depends on it". Think of it as a slogan.

Now comes the "art part": based on your "message" create a rough sketch of what your "message" looks like in pictures, you can use words as well. For instance you may want to write your “message” within your artwork. Use the hexagon template for your sketch or just sketch out a hexagon. The final art piece must be a **HEXAGON** shape, so you should plan how you will use that shape from the very first sketch :)

*Please do not jump ahead. This week I only want the message and a rough sketch of your idea. If you turn it in please look for feedback before you move on to the next step.

PART 2: due June 1st

Once you have been given feedback on your theme, message and sketch you may begin your final design.

You may use any art materials that you have.

Use the HEXAGON template for your final copy. If you can't print it out you can draw a hexagon using a ruler.

This is a very open-ended assignment, feel free to be creative and innovative. I can't



wait to see what you create!
