one class for an art critique)

Students will create an artwork that exhibits their personal interpretation
of "kindness." Student artwork can be from a personal experience, an
idea of an action, an emotion relating to kindness, or etc. Student artwork
must have a hexagonal perimeter to meet the parameters set forth by the Hexagon Project.
Students will be able to communicate their opinion about their own
artwork. Students will be able to interpret as well as compare/contrast
the work of others through an age-appropriate art critique.

<u>Introduction</u>

 Choose a video that best suits your students' age, development, interests, etc.

Ask students:

- What did you see in the video that stood out to you? Why?
- Are your experiences with kindness similar or no? Why?
- How do you think kindness impacted the people in the video?

Have students Think-Pair-Share (in person, small group discussion posts, or on breakout rooms, ex: Zoom) about one or more of these questions. Then, have a group discussion by having students report to the class about what they discussed. The responses to the whole group discussion can also be done on Padlet (written discussion posts) or Flipgrid (video discussion posts) for virtual learners.

Lesson for Day 1

Day 1:

Use a whiteboard/digital whiteboard, chalkboard, projector (typing projected responses), or giant notebook to create a mind map or write down kindness ideas. If teaching synchronously through a video, this activity can also be done on a digital discussion forum like Padlet where students can list ideas underneath each question and all questions & answers will display on one screen in tiles that are arranged into columns. Students can also use speech-to-text if they struggle with typing or writing skills. If teaching asynchronously, students can use Flipgrid to answer questions and respond to classmates through videos. If teaching young students with special needs who are verbal, Flipgrid may help them to communicate their ideas better than typed responses.

Ask students:

- What does kindness mean to you?
- What are acts of kindness?
- How can we represent kindness in artwork?
- What have you done that is kind?
- What have others done for you that is kind?
- What colors or images might represent kindness or happiness?

After having a discussion, have students fold a piece of paper into thirds horizontally then into thirds vertically. This will create a 9-section paper. For virtual options, have students draw on Seesaw or Sketchbook (Post a screenshot of Sketchbook drawing into a media album in your LMS). Have students create 9 different kindness ideas that they can use for their artwork. Then, have students create a rough draft of their hexagon. If students are being provided with options of media, let students know what their parameters and media options are. Have students label what media they will use for their projects. Alternatively, let students know what media you will be providing for them to use for this project.

For students with special needs, it might be helpful to provide images of different acts of kindness with labels below them to help with idea generation. For students with special needs that can read, it might be helpful to provide a list of acts of kindness to help them with idea generation. Providing students with less sections (Ex: fold the paper in half twice or providing separate sheets for students who draw large) may help with attaining the task. Alternatively, if providing a list of ideas or pictures for idea generation is not in line with your teaching practice, providing students with a graphic organizer or sentence starter may help. For example: In this box, draw a picture that finishes this sentence:

- I help my classmates/friends/teacher/parents/guardians/siblings/pets/animals when I....
- I feel helped when someone ...
- I show kindness during school when I....
- I show kindness at home/playground/cafeteria/store/etc. when I....
- Kindness means...
- What colors or images represent kindness...
- The best act of kindness someone did for me was...
- Did you ever meet someone new through an act of kindness? What did it look like?

Discuss each student's ideas with them as they are drawing their sketches. When students have all 9 sketches done, have them move on to their rough draft (no color is needed, unless desired). Provide students with an outline of a hexagon for a rough draft that meets the size requirements. Students can also participate in a brainstorming activity provided by the Hexagon Project:

Wrap-Up for Day 1:

The teacher can conduct a short discussion about what ideas students had for their sketches or hexagon. Students can respond to a digital exit ticket on Google Forms as a formative assessment.

Example questions for an exit ticket:

- What does kindness mean to you?
- What inspired you to create your artwork today (video, classmate, etc.)?
- How does kindness impact others?
- What kindness ideas did you draw today?

Creation Days

Days 2 and 3:

	Students will continue to create their Hexagons using chosen or provided materials. The teacher can demonstrate idea generation for artwork, use of colors, use of images, use of elements of art, use of a particular medium, etc. in order to help children create and refine their project.
Wrap-Up for	Day 4:
Project	The teacher will begin an age-appropriate art critique of student hexagons. The teacher will model how to interpret some sample hexagon artworks. The teacher can also choose to have opposite classes interpret each other's artworks (anonymous) in order for students to feel more comfortable with saying their thoughts. The teacher will then have students participate in forming their own
	opinions and interpretations about artworks.
Assessments	Questioning and discussion, observation of sketching, rubric for hexagon (if desired for grading purposes), digital exit ticket, and discussion posts (Padlet, Flipgrid, etc.).
