





Interdependence Day History

Interdependence Day was launched in Philadelphia on September 12, 2003 as a post 9/11 symbol of regeneration, as a time to reflect on the tragedy of the incidents of terror in the US and worldwide, and to ask, "What Next?"

It seemed critically important to acknowledge the inevitability and significance of interdependence in our time, and set out to build constructively, and civilly, and culturally, a global civil society.



"WeReclaim! Lower South Valley"

Three organizations worked together on this environmental project that explored the intertwined story of the land, people, and industry in the anthracite coal region. Lessons utilized a hands-on, STEAM-based approach, integrating science and the arts and emphasizing interconnection. The goal is to understand current problems and how they can be addressed, as well as how similar problems might be avoided in the

future. Thanks to the leadership of Earth Conservancy's Communications Director Elizabeth Hughes with Carol Nicholas, Director of the SHINE Program based at Wilkes University and the Hexagon Project, we now share this <u>outstanding environmental lesson plan</u> on our website.
